


I hope you have enjoyed our little tour through the Tabernacle in the wilderness. There is lots more to learn, but this is the final lesson in our little series.

The Offerings - A Little Picture

GOD

All burnt on the altar.
Sweet savour offering.

Leviticus ch

BURNT OFFERING

Jesus gave Himself to God as a perfect sacrifice.

Fine flour, oil, frankincense.
Sweet savour offering.

MEAL OFFERING

Jesus lived a perfect life, and gave His life as a perfect man.

Part of it for God, part for man. Sweet savour offering.

PEACE OFFERING

Both God and man could be satisfied by Jesus' death on the cross.

Blood, fat on altar. Bullock burnt outside the camp.

SIN OFFERING

The Lord Jesus became 'sin for us', taking our place, outside Jerusalem

Blood, fat of ram on altar. Payback & 1/5 extra paid.

TRESPASS OFFERING

The full price for sins was more than paid, when Jesus died.



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MAN

The Offerings - read about them in Leviticus 1-7

The 5 main offerings in the early chapters of the book of Leviticus, give us a most beautiful picture of the Person and work of the Lord Jesus Christ, the true "Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world" (John 1:29). Each offering on its own gives us a special insight into the work of Christ, but when all 5 are combined they give us a tiny idea of how much meaning there is in the death of Christ. Someone has described it as "so many mirrors arranged around the Lord and the cross so that each one reflects a special view of His Person and work" (R.K. Campbell, BibleCentre.org).

Some of the offerings were 'sweet savour'. This means that they had a special fragrance for God. God took special pleasure in them. Can you guess why?
